Each July, Ogden is transformed back to the days of the Wild West with the annual Ogden Pioneer Days celebration. With something for everyone, of all ages and interests, events take place throughout the month at Ogden Pioneer Stadium and all around town.

Art strolls, pageants, farmers market, parades, concerts, and films pair up with barrel racing, bareback riding, mutton bustin, and rodeo complete with fireworks. Concerts July 5, 14, and 18; Traces of the West art show and Utah Cowboy Hall of Fame July 5; Trail to Pioneer Days horses on display; Wild West shoot-out, Children's parade and Junior Posse Jamboree July 13; Horse & Hitch parade July 15; Special Kids Rodeo July 16; Downtown Hoedown July 18; and rodeo July 19 through 24. Rodeo events sell out quickly so get your tickets early.

Fire Restrictions for many areas of Ogden



Ogden City has issued fire restrictions for Fort Buenaventura due to high amounts of cotton in the area through July 31 or until conditions improve. In addition, all firework devices are *prohibited* in the following restricted areas:

- all of Fort Buenaventura, the Serge Simmons Field baseball park, and the dog park area located near A Ave
- all areas east of Harrison Blvd from the north city boundary to the south city boundary
- all wooded areas along the Weber River and Ogden River parkways and any associated parks along the river corridor
- any mountainous, brush-covered, or forest-covered areas or zones with open fields, vacant lots, wooded areas, and brush-covered hillsides throughout Ogden

Those responsible for fires, including the parents of minors, will be held accountable for cost of damages and expenses for firefighting efforts. *Report all fires and fireworks you witness* in restricted areas by calling Weber Area Consolidated Dispatch Center at 801-629-8221.

The best way to enjoy fireworks is to attend a professional display. If you choose to light fireworks on your own, treat them with respect and care.; follow guidelines from the Utah State Fire Marshal <http://publicsafety.utah.gov/firemarshal/fireworks.html>. If you start a fire, you will be held responsible.

Glass Recycling comes to Ogden

Watch for large containers marked "Glass Recycling" conveniently located at Bonneville Park (360 Monroe Blvd), Green Waste Site (1845 Monroe Blvd), and Ogden High School's south parking lot (2828 Harrison Blvd). All types of glass are accepted including brown, green, and clear glass. Please note, glass is *prohibited* in the blue recycle bins the City provides for curbside collection; those are to be used strictly for plastic, aluminum, and paper products.

Momentum Recycling will maintain the glass recycling bins turning post-consumer glass into high-quality raw materials such as decorative tiles, fiberglass insulation, sandblasting, filtration systems, and concrete additives. Rinse out glass bottles and jars before depositing into the glass recycling bins.



Council Adopts FY 2014 Budget

On June 18, Ogden City Council adopted the Fiscal Year 2014 budget for the City. This year's budget process included multiple opportunities for public input and significant effort by all involved. Council discussions throughout the budget process focused primarily on City services

and infrastructure, employee wages and benefits, public safety, community planning, parks and recreation programs, and economic development.

Council Chair Bart Blair said, "Each year the budget process allows the City Council to perform its legislative role to adopt

the Ogden City, Redevelopment Agency, and Municipal Building Authority budgets. The budget authorizes the many services provided by the City."

R.A.M.P. grants spruce up City

Funds awarded by Weber County's R.A.M.P. (Recreation, Arts, Museum and Parks) tax grant program will fund eight new projects in Ogden over the summer to enhance the high adventure lifestyle for which our city is known. Nearly \$678,000 in grants will repair and secure the wooden trusses and roofing materials at Lorin Farr Pavilion, update trail signs and totems with directions, distances, and descriptions, and connect the Centennial Trail to the Ogden River Parkway Trail and along Madison Blvd. Funds will also be used to purchase new sports field and greens equipment, an ultraviolet light system and pool cover, and assist efforts with the Weber River restoration project.

Backpack Bonanza provides school supplies for needy students

Catholic Community Services (CCS) is teaming up with Ogden City to collect items to help needy children in our area be successful in the coming school year.

The Backpack Bonanza program collects *new* backpacks and school supplies such as pens, paper, crayons, colored pencils, folders, and notebooks now through August 9. The items will be distributed by the Joyce Hansen Hall Food Bank to more than 2,000 underprivileged children giving them a head start to learning.

Citizen Corps: Understanding the Utilities of Your Home

Fast and free energy saving tips for hot months

- Be a speedy chef. Microwaves use two-thirds less energy than stoves.
- Use the dishwasher; it uses less water than washing by hand. Run full loads and turn off the dry cycle.
- Set thermostat to 78 when you are home and 85 when you are away.
- Use ceiling fans and room fans.
- Avoid running appliances during peak hours of 4 p.m. to 6 p.m.
- Use warm or cool water settings for laundry, rinse in cold, and line dry.
- Turn off appliances, lights, and equipment when not in use and unplug electronics and chargers when they aren't being used.
- Turn computers and printers off at the power strip.
