Ogden Fire Department shares Fireworks Safety Tips

Be sure your holiday celebrations are both fun and safe by following these safety guidelines and reporting any illegal or suspicious activity. Throughout the summer, fire department staff will assess the conditions and issue fire and fireworks restrictions as needed. Visit the Utah State Fire Marshal's website at <http://publicsafety.utah.gov/firemarshal>.

- Keep at least 30 feet from any residence, dwelling, structure, tree, power line, or overhead obstruction.
- Be aware of wind speed and direction before igniting aerial devices. Once ignited, aerial devices cannot be stopped; they will continue to fire each shot until all shots are spent.
- You will be held responsible if your fireworks land and start a fire.
- Do not use illegal fireworks including firecrackers, m-80s, cherry bombs, bottle rockets, roman candles, single or reloadable mortars, and ground salutes.



Crime in Ogden down 15 percent in last five years

Ogden City crime numbers have dropped 15 percent in the last five years and 13 percent in the past year thanks to better crime analysis and the hard work of the men and women of the Ogden Police Department.

Proactively policing areas that have been identified as high crime areas is one of the main reasons for the drop in numbers. The Real Time Crime Center analyzed Part 1 Crimes (rape, homicide, aggravated assault, armed robbery, and motor vehicle theft) and measured 12 different crime offenses. Motor vehicle theft showed the biggest drop at 51 percent and residential burglaries dropped from 672 offenses in 2007 to just 466 occurrences in 2012, a 25 percent reduction.

Solving transportation needs for a growing community

The Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT), in cooperation with the Federal Highway Administration, is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement to study a potential transportation corridor in western Davis and Weber counties. The study evaluates transportation needs for this area through the year 2040 while considering community and environmental concerns.

The Draft Environmental Impact Statement is available for review at www.udot.utah.gov/westdavis. The public is encouraged to review and comment on the draft through August 23 for UDOT's study team to consider. A final Record of Decision on a transportation alternative through western Davis and Weber counties is expected in 2014.

Don't leave kids or pets in hot cars

It takes only ten minutes for the inside of a car to reach 100 degrees on a 75-degree day—even if parked in the shade with the windows down. The temperature inside a vehicle is usually 40 to 50 degrees hotter than outside. Keep children and animals safe by taking them with you. In a hot car, “just a minute” can cause hazardous, even deadly, consequences. It is illegal to leave children or pets unattended in a vehicle. Call animal services at 801-395-8221 if you see a pet or 9-1-1 if you see a child in a hot car. An officer will be dispatched immediately to rescue pets or children in distress.

Sharing Ogden's trails with rattlesnakes

Do you know what to do if a rattlesnake crosses your path? Most snake encounters occur while hiking in wooded areas or camping around rocks. Rattlesnakes only attack when threatened, stepped on, or caught unawares, so if you see a snake, do not try to catch, harass, or kill it. If you are bitten by a snake seek medical attention immediately.

Tips from Wild Aware Utah (wildawareutah.org) for observing rattlesnakes while avoiding conflict:

- Observe rattlesnakes from a safe distance
- Learn the difference between non-venomous and venomous snakes
- Never poke or try to handle a venomous snake
- Teach children to leave snakes alone
- Be alert, snakes hide well
- Stay on paths and cleared areas
- In tall grasses use a stick to sweep the area as you walk
- Snakes are more active at night and like to hide in woodpiles and brush piles
- When camping, use a floored tent with a zipper door and keep shoes and clothing inside the tent
- Look carefully before sitting down on the ground or on rocks and logs
- Wear boots or other closed-toe shoes while hiking
- Purchase a snake bite kit to take with you when hiking or camping

Citizen Corps: Make it a Safe Summer

Did you know more accidents occur during summer months than at any other time of year? Make it a safe summer by taking precautions and being aware.

- When driving, reduce speeds, wear seatbelts, avoid distracted or impaired driving, and be sure young children use a child safety seat correctly.
- When swimming, avoid the use of alcohol and be sure no one becomes exhausted in the water. The number one prevention tool against drowning is a personal flotation device or life jacket.
- Realize that heat kills by stressing the human body beyond its natural limits. Heat stroke is a true medical emergency; call 9-1-1 or get the victim to a hospital quickly. Delay can be fatal.
