Ogden Pioneer Days Celebration and Rodeo

While the snow may still top the peak of Mt. Ogden, the organizers of the annual Ogden Pioneer Days rodeo and community extravaganza are busy at work on the summer's biggest and best statehood celebration.

Is it past your curfew?

Ogden City's community policing officers are reminding teenagers, and their parents, about nighttime curfews. As school is out for the summer and we linger in the warmer weather and longer days, please keep in mind that teenagers should be home by nightfall. These laws are in effect not to restrict independence, but to help protect the safety and well being of minors.



The nighttime curfew says it is unlawful for any minor under the age of sixteen to loiter or remain in any public place within the city between 10pm and 5am. By age sixteen, the curfew moves to midnight and states it is unlawful for any minor sixteen years of age or older to loiter or remain in any public place within the city between the hours of 12am and 5am.

Increased Regulations on Fireworks for the July Holidays

The upcoming holidays in July provide great opportunities to create lasting memories with friends and family while enjoying the warm weather and fun celebrations. But before you celebrate with fireworks this year, make sure everyone in your group knows about fireworks safety.

- Read and follow label directions
- Keep a bucket of water nearby
- Buy from reliable sellers
- Always have adult supervision
- Never light fireworks indoors
- Never re-light a “dud” firework
- Never give fireworks to children



Fireworks may only be discharged three days prior to, the day of, and three days after the 4th and 24th of July. A new ordinance put into effect last year includes a time of day restriction now as well—fireworks may only be ignited between 11am and 11pm on the designated days. Anyone found igniting fireworks outside of the approved time frame, or igniting illegal fireworks brought in from out of state, will be cited. It is a Class B Misdemeanor to transport fireworks across State lines unless a person is a licensed distributor.

Mad Science Classes at Dinosaur Park

This year the dinosaur park is offering science classes through the summer. Kids from kindergarten to sixth grade are invited to experience hands-on science in a fun and entertaining atmosphere. Classes are Mondays, June 7 through August 9, 1 to 4pm in the theater room at the dinosaur park museum, 1544 E Park Blvd. Only 25 students are allowed per class, so sign up now by calling 801-629-8877. Cost per class is \$35 (or \$30 for park members) and includes all supplies.

- **June 7: Rockin' Rocket Science** – Build and Launch rockets in this exciting three hour class. Then take your rocket home.
- **June 14: Walloping Weather** – Discover the power of weather. Make a UV Detector and a thunderbolt. Explore the density with liquids. Make a UV chain.
- **June 21: Decomposers** – Discover the amazing ability of the common worm! Play with your own worm buddy. Learn how to improve the environment through waste reduction.
- **June 28: Watts-Up** – Learn the science behind lighting and electricity and then excite some electrons and create some serious circuits. Leave with your very own static stick.
- **July 5: Science at the Movies** – Lights, Camera, Action! There's science on the set. See how color and light relate, and play with

your very own Technicolor blender.

- **July 12: Tantalizing Taste** – Develop a taste for science.; explore your amazing tongue. Take home the scratch and match game.
- **July 19: Science of Magic and Toys** – Explore the science behind cool magic tricks. Play with your very own Mad Science yo-yo.
- **July 26: Playing with Polymers** – Slime it up! Discover the properties of polymers and leave with your very own slime.

Graffiti Removal: 801-629-8752

Don't let graffiti detract from the beauty of our city. If property in your neighborhood has become the victim of graffiti, get help from Ogden City's Graffiti Task Force. This is an independent organization that uses resources from the Weber County Juvenile Court to remove graffiti from private residences. Citizens may call 801-629-8752 to report graffiti, and the task force will work promptly to remove it, in most cases within 24 hours. Citizens are encouraged to add this number to their cell phone's contact list so they can report graffiti immediately when they see it. To report graffiti on City property, call Ogden City Public Services at 801-629-8284.

Sustainable Ogden Committee provides our Green Tip of the Month:

Water Saving Tips: •Use a broom instead of a hose to clear/clean your driveway. •Lawns need only ½ to 1½ inches of water per week; use an empty tuna can to measure when you've reached the limit. •Air drying uses 15 to 50 percent less energy in practically the same amount of time, so use your dishwasher's air-dry setting instead of the heat-dry option. If it doesn't have an air-dry setting, simply open the door once the final rinse is complete. •If each U.S. household installed one low-flow sink faucet or aerator, it would save more than 60 billion gallons of water annually. •Installing low-flow fixtures and aerators on faucets will conserve gallons of water each year. •Repair leaky faucets or pipes promptly.
